Online Mandated Reporter Training

All new volunteers are now required to complete an online portion of training as part of their volunteer process **in addition to** the face-to-face youth protection training. This portion of the training is done through 4-H Online and will take approximately 1 - 1 1/2 hours to complete and includes a quiz. Instructions on how to complete this online training are included in this newsletter.

Background Checks

All new volunteers and returning volunteers falling on their 4 year rotation for a background check will be required to pass the National Background Check prior to their acceptance as a 4-H volunteer. Background checks are conducted by the state 4-H office and will be done every 2 weeks. 


Alumni Alert



GENERAL RULES AND JUDGING OF ESSAY, POSTER OR VIDEO POWER POINT ENTRIES

- 1) 4-H MEMBERS MAY ENTER AN ESSAY, POSTER OR VIDEO POWER POINT. Members with more than one entry will be counted as one entry in their club. Club participation will be decided by adding the eligible entries together and dividing by the current number of members enrolled in the club.
- 2) Individual or group power point or video addressing a safety issue or concern. Maximum time is 2 minutes for individual or a group. Maximum time is 5 minutes. No trademarks or copyrighted materials.
- 3) All 4-H clubs entering this contest are to bring their entries to Clover College at the Chippewa Falls Middle School on Saturday, January 14th beginning at 8:30 a.m. The judging will begin at 9:00 a.m. in the Commons area.
- 4) Volunteers will do judging of the safety contest entries during Clover College. All worthy entries will receive a certificate of participation. Each club that has entries to be judged must have at least one representative from the club at the judging.

Essays, posters and video power point presentations not following the rules will be disqualified from the club's 75% participation goals. Members, parents, and leaders - Please inspect the essays carefully before bringing them in for judging! Be sure members follow contest rules! (NOTE: Alcohol, drugs, and tobacco are generally health issues, NOT safety issues.)

ESSAY CONTEST RULES

- The general topic is SAFETY. Consider your 4-H project(s). Create your own special title and essay.
- 2) Paper must be standard size (8-1/2 x 11"). The Extension Office has a special page for Cloverbuds to use for their essay ("story"),* available upon request.
- 3) Tell your story completely.

- *Cloverbud members may draw a simple picture and then, with help from dad, mom or a 4-H leader, add one or two sentences to explain the picture for their essay story.
- 4) Write the essay on one side of the paper only, and write on every other line (double space if typing).
- 5) Members Neatly print your name, grade, division, and 4-H Club on the back of each sheet.
- 6) Essays may be printed or written neatly in longhand. Typed entries must be done by the contestant.

Guidelines for Essays:

- Originality (NOT someone else's idea or essay)
- Correct spelling, punctuation, complete sentences
- Interesting beginning, good theme, development, good conclusion
- Rules followed: write on every other line, etc.
- Name, grade, division, 4-H Club neatly on back of essay.
 - POSTER CONTEST RULES
- The general topic is SAFETY. (They MUST RELATE to your project(s) to be entered At The Fair.)
- Posters using copyrighted materials WILL NOT be accepted.
- 3) A minimum of a one-inch border is required.
- 4) Neatly print your name, grade, division and 4-H club on the back of the poster.

- 5) Entries must be made on poster board or tag board. The required poster size is 14" x 22". Entries must be flat, not rolled.
- Any kind of art media may be used. For example

 paint, crayons, ink, "cut-outs", etc., but no 3-D
 material allowed.

Hints for Posters:

- Keep poster message simple use big, bold letters
- Poster title and message must be clearly legible from a distance of 10 feet
- Different colored letters within the same word are discouraged.

Guidelines for Posters:

- 14" x 22" size
- 1" margin all the way around
- Original work versus computer aided graphics
- Letters easy to read from a distance
- Eye catching does it catch or demand your attention?
- Safety issues does it relate to your project? (it has to if it is for the fair!)
- NO HEALTH ISSUES smoking, alcohol, drugs, etc. are generally Health Issues!
- Is the title in larger letters than the content?
- Is there enough margin and space around the edges and between line of letters?

VIDEO/POWER POINT RULES

- Individual or group power point or video addressing a safety issue or concern.
- Maximum time is 2 minutes for individual or a group.
- Maximum time is 5 minutes.
- No trademarks or copyrighted materials.

SOFTWARE REQUIREMENTS

There are no special software requirements except to use an updated browser (Google's Chrome and Apple's Safari work the best for this training).

SIGNING UP FOR THE TRAINING

- 1. Log into 4HOnline with your family login.
- 2. Click on the Continue to Family button.
- 3. In the family Member/Volunteer List, click on Edit for your name.
- 4. Under the blue bar below the UW-Extension logo, click on Trainings.
- 5. If you have already signed up for the training, click on the Edit/View button and skip to step
 7; otherwise click on the Sign Up for a Training button.
- 6. Click on the **Sign Up** button next to the training you wish to enroll in.

Engineering Challenge

The Chippewa County 4-H Engineering Challenge is back!!! We will again be testing your skills for the bridge building and tractor pull. After some input from last years' young engineers I decided to do a new challenge as well... a 'rat-a-pult'! All contests open to all 4-H members.





Bridge Building-

Competitors will be given a set amount of wood strips to build a bridge that will span a 15.5 inch distance and be no longer than 16 inches. The only building material to be used will be the supplied wood strips. The only fastening of strips will be glue of their own choosing. The winner will be the bridge that holds the most weight before collapsing.

Tractor Pull-

Competitors will be using a single Victor rat trap, no other forms of stored energy, such as weights or springs, etc. will be allowed. Design will be open to the competitor, and the only part supplied will be the trap. Each competitor will be allowed three pulls at different weights of their choosing, with the highest rat-powered tractor winning.



Rat-a-pult-

Competitors will be using a single Victor rat trap, no other forms of stored energy, such as weights or springs, etc. will be allowed. Design will be open to the competitor, and the only part supplied will be the trap. They will be launching a tennis ball into a bucket three times. The one who can get the ball into the bucket from the greatest distance is the winner.

This years competition will once again be held at the Teen's Volleyball Tournament in Cadott on March 19th.

Bridge building supplies and one trap cost \$10.00, additional traps are \$2.00 ea. and will be available at the Extension Office.

Demonstration & Speaking Contest

Helping people speak in front of groups is one of the most important life skills 4-H offers. One of the best ways to help 4-H members prepare for the future is by helping them to become better public speakers & demonstrators. With this in mind, we would like all clubs to work together to stress the importance of speaking & demonstrations.

4-H Demonstrating

The ability to demonstrate is an important speaking skill. Demonstrating means that you show how to do or make something while you talk. Here are some tips:

- Select something that you do well.
- Make attractive posters. Use large letters and space them so that they are easy to read
- · Assemble all materials necessary to complete your demonstration.
- Demonstrate as you talk.
- Show the finished product.
- · Summarize the steps of the demonstration.

An educational brochure is available from the Extension Office on how to do a demonstration.

DEMONSTRATION DIVISION

Age categories and time limits:

- "Cloverbuds (K-2) maximum time: 3 minutes
- " 3rd & 4th Grade: 4-5 minutes
- "5th & 6th Grade: 5-8 minutes
- "7th & 8th Grade: 6-10 minutes
- "9th Grade & Up: 8-15 minutes

The categories listed below are types of demonstrations that can be done in the contest. You may enter more than one category. You may also enter as an individual and/or as a team in each category.

<u>Formal Demonstrations</u> - Showing and telling the audience how to make or do something. Presents information through <u>actions</u> with an explanation. Has an introduction, body, conclusion, and a time to answer questions. Length is determined by your age group (see above).

<u>Illustrated Talk</u> - Presents information with the use of visual aids such as maps, charts, posters, graphs, pictures, slides, or models. Has an introduction, body, conclusion, and time to answer questions. Length is determined by age group (see above).

<u>Action Center</u> - Sharing ideas and showing how to do a skill in an informal way. The audience should participate and ask questions throughout the entire demonstration. The demonstrator converses with the audience members who are standing around the

demonstration area. Audience participates by talking with the demonstrator, trying things, doing, and tasting, judging, asking questions. Handouts may be used (instructions, recipes, etc.). Posters or pictures can be used. The demonstration should be 15-30 minutes long. A brochure is available at the Extension Office which gives tips for planning and presenting your action center.

Recognition:

- All Demonstration Contest participants will receive a fair ribbon.
- · Certificates will be awarded for each participant.
- The top two demonstrations in the middle or high school categories from each county will also have the opportunity to represent their county at the 2017 State Fair (demonstrator must be at least 12 years of age).
- Fair premiums will be offered to all participants, per individual county rules. You
 MUST enter your demonstration on your fair form to receive premium. Premiums
 will be paid along with your regular fair check. The <u>deadline to register</u> (late entries
 will NOT receive fair premiums) is January 9, 2017.

SPEAKING DIVISION

The following are four categories and rules (enter any or all):

Original Speech

Cloverbuds: up to 1 minute (Grades K-2) Novice: 1-2 minutes (Grades 3 & 4) Junior: 2-3 minutes (Grades 5 & 6) Intermediate: 3-4 minutes (Grades 7 & 8)

Senior: 4-6 minutes (Grades 9-13)

Rules:

- 1. Talk must be developed by the member who is presenting it. It cannot have been given previously in another contest or previously critiqued.
- 2. Only Cloverbud & Novice division speakers may have their speeches written out and read them. Junior through Senior division speakers should use note cards.

Interpretive Reading

Cloverbuds: Up to 1 minute (Grades K-2) Novice: 1-2 minutes (Grades 3 & 4) Junior: 2-3 minutes (Grades 5 & 6) Intermediate: 3-4 minutes (Grades 7 & 8)

Senior: 4-6 minutes (Grades 9-13)

Rules:

- 1. Readings may be either prose, poetry, original, or a selected reading. If not original, the author should be credited.
- 2. All readers should use full-size copies of their selections (**NO** notecards). Please mount your copy on construction paper or other heavy paper (8 ½ x 11" or 9 x 12"). Do NOT read your selection from the book.
- 3. Create an introduction to introduce your reading.

Contact the Extension Office for an information sheet that provides more information and tips for doing Interpretive Readings.

<u>4-H Promotion</u> - Your chance to promote 4-H. Tell why you are involved and why others should join. Props or visual aids are optional.

- Novice: 1-2 minutes (Grades 3 & 4)
- Junior: 2-3 minutes (Grades 5 & 6)
- Intermediate & Senior: 3-4 minutes (Grades 7-13)

<u>Dynamic Duo</u> - For a team of two - may be two 4-H members of any age or combination of ages or a 4-H member and an adult. This is an interpretive reading consisting of a dialogue for two. Up to 6 minutes in length.

Each participant will receive a participation ribbon and a certificate. A top overall speaker in each age division will be selected and receive a trophy (across all entry divisions). The Chippewa County recipients will have their name and year engraved on a plaque that is displayed at the Chippewa County Extension Office.

SATURDAY, MARCH 11TH, 10:00 A.M. CADOTT HIGH SCHOOL

ALL plays must be registered at the Chippewa County Extension Office by Monday, February 27th. Telephone registrations will NOT be accepted.

A set of rules for our festival follow.

- 1. **Entry Division and Length of Performances**: The difference between the two drama categories is as follows:
 - a. *On-Stage Drama* is a traditional one-act play using full costumes, props and sets. This may be performed on a stage with or without curtains.
 - 1. One play, any length up to 30 minutes, including set-up and take-down time. It is suggested that performances be about 20 minutes in length.
 - 2. Performances must include two or more actors.
 - 3. Any props that touch the floor must have felt on them to protect the floor.
 - b. *Mini-Dramas and Skits* can be performed at or in any place *(setting)* and might include puppetry, creative dramatics, etc. No stage or lighting will be provided. Performances must include two or more actors.
 - 1. *Mini-dramas* may use costumes and props similar to on-stage drama performances
 - 2. **Skits** use **minimal** props and costumes (less is better)
 - 3. Mini drama and skit performances can be any length up to 15 minutes, including setup and take-down time. Plays need to be within guideline.
 - c. *Puppetry* can be up to 15 minutes and provide own puppet stage.
- 2. All actors must be 4-H members. The director(s) may be any 4-H member(s) and/or adult(s).
- 3. Stage lighting may be available, depending on facilities (mini-drama and skits no stage or lighting provided).
- 4. On-Stage Drama Props: Drama groups should plan for special props and sound effects equipment as needed. Any props need to have felt on the bottom to avoid scratching the stage.

- 5. No hay or straw bales, animals, candles, real fire or real weapons are allowed.
- 6. If a club uses fake weaponry or strobe lights, it must be noted on the registration form.
- 7. Clubs may have more than one entry, but a 4-H member can be involved in only one play.
- 8. The Drama Festival staff will have a Stage Manager/Emcee who will introduce the Club and the Club's Emcee. The Club's Emcee will be expected to introduce the play and set the scene for their play. Introduction of cast used at club's discretion. This will not be timed.
- 9. Your presentation must not be the same one your club presented last year.
- 10. Music plays (NOT reviews), where music is used as part of the play, are acceptable.
- 11. Each group will receive a critique from the evaluators. Each drama participant will receive a participation ribbon and certificate. Ratings will be gold or silver.
- 12. Each entry will be given an "Award of Merit" for their area of outstanding achievement. The awards will be given from the following categories:
 - Total Voice Projection
 - Cooperation, Enthusiasm and Spirit
 - Characterization
 - Creative Costuming
 - Audience Appeal
 - Creative Theme Development
 - Set
 - Humor
- 13. Individual awards for outstanding youth performers will be presented, not to exceed two youth per play.
- 14. Best Actor and Best Actress will be selected from each county.

Other helpful information

Evaluation Form: Upon your request, the committee will send an evaluation form that will be used at the festival. It notes the essential parts for viewing and critiquing a dramatic performance, and will be your copy for study prior to the play.

- 9. Up to two outstanding art items will be selected, to represent each county at next year's State 4-H Art Exhibition. Any items selected for the State Contest must be transportable to Madison during the State 4-H and Youth Conference.
- 10. All drawings and paintings are to be matted, framed, or mounted on tag board.
- 11. Any special accessories needed for display of an individual member's exhibit are to be supplied by the exhibitor.
- 12. 4-H members must bring their exhibit(s) to one of the evaluators between 8:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. Please stagger arrival times to avoid lines and waiting. Only when it is impossible for the member to attend will the committee allow someone else to bring their exhibit. The evaluators will go over these exhibits later.
- 13. No critique forms will be filled out due to face-to-face judging.
- 14. Exhibits should be picked up and taken home at 2:00 p.m. No early removals, please.
