What is the difference between a PROJECT and an ACTIVITY?

Project

A 4-H project is an area that you want to learn more about during the year. There are projects on just about any topic you would like to study and explore, from art to woodworking, from computers to rabbits, from clothing to small engines.

Most project work occurs over a period of several weeks or months during the year. Any project 4-H members select should be based on:

- interests, needs and time available
- Availability of necessary tools and equipment
- Financial resources

A 4-H project consists of meetings, field trips and related activities with the guidance of a volunteer and with the support of the member's parent(s), but it is important that the 4-H members do the actual work themselves. Projects are planned objectives that can be attained and measured and summarized by some form of record keeping.

Remember you'll learn more than "subject matter" as you complete your projects. You'll learn many "life" skills that you'll use every day of your life, such as, understanding yourself, communicating better, solving problems, making decisions, and working with others. Good luck in your project selections. You have until March 1, 2018 to select and confirm your projects for this 4-H year.

Activity

An activity is an opportunity to experience a short or long term opportunity. Some examples of 4-H activities include: camp, teens, service learning, leathercraft, small engines, plant workshop, shooting sports, etc. If you wish to exhibit a project at the fair, you would need to carry as a project not only participate in the subject matter as an activity.

Youth Protection Training

A youth protection training session for new and incoming volunteers that have not yet completed this training will be held on Tuesday. Online Mandated Reporter Training

All volunteers are now required to complete an online another fun filled event again this year! Clover volunteer training as part of their volunteer acceptance process. This is called the Mandated Reporter training. This portion of the training is done through 4-H Online and will take approximately 1 - 1 1/2 hours to complete and include a guiz. It is very important to 4-H and UW-Extension to ensure our youth are safe while attending and participating in

4-H events. Instructions on how to complete this online training are included in this newsletter.

Background Checks

All new volunteers and returning volunteers falling on their 4-year rotation for a background check will be required to pass the National Background check prior to their acceptance as a 4-H volunteer. Background checks are conducted by the state 4-H office and will be done every 2 (two) weeks. Volunteers will receive an email from GIS requesting the necessary information to complete the check and has a response deadline of 5 days. After the 5 day deadline the link is no longer valid and you will go into the second attempt group approximately 2-4 weeks later. If you fail to complete the information on the second attempt it will be assumed you are no longer interested in being a volunteer. Please be sure to look for this email from GIS about two weeks after you enroll. Check your spam mail as well.

Enrollment Process Change

New this year, we will not be accepting members at the County level before they are accepted by the Enrollment Coordinator at club level. We are encouraging all Enrollment Coordinators to work closely with the club Treasurer to ensure members have paid their club dues before they are accepted to the club. We hope this new process will help eliminate enrollment issues that clubs are experiencing.

As a reminder, certain 4-H activities require participants to be a 4-H member; therefore, club dues must be paid prior to participation. In addition, the member may be required to be in good standing with their 4-H club and county. All participants are encouraged to review group/activity rules/bylaws prior to registering to the activity to ensure you meet the required criteria.

New process for trip applicants

In order to be selected as a representative on select 4-H award experiences (trips), Chippewa County 4-H members will need to go through steps similar to applying for a job. These workforce readiness skills include developing a cover letter and personal resume, obtaining two non-related adult recommendations and participate in an interview conducted by Chippewa County 4-H Leaders Council Members and local business leaders.

4-H award trip interviews not only provide a means to determine scholarship distribution to the applications but as a lifelong learning skill. Interviews provide an avenue for youth to receive constructive feedback in a low-stress environment. The exercises can help the participants boost their confidence as well as reduce anxiety about future interviewing situations. Youth establish their skills of interviewing preparation, answering questions about themselves in a timely matter, acceptable body language, as well as developing insightful responses to interview questions. Interviews are not only a great way to calm their nerves, but they can also give them guidance, which can help these members through their next job interview.

4-H Club Treasurers & Leaders

As you are probably aware, keeping good club treasury records is more important than ever. You may have also discovered that it's much easier to keep an accurate, on-going record of income and payments than to try and recreate it later. To get off to a good start this year we strongly urge you to the following:

Use the Club Financial Records forms provided to you at Club Officer Training. If you need copies, please contact our office. You can also find a Financial Record form in Excel format on our website to use as your ledger. This document can be saved to your computer and the math is done for you.

Start your records as of July 1, 2017. July 1, 2017 - June 30, 2018 is the period of activity that will need to be audited next year through the Club/Group Charter. We need to get in the habit of using these dates.

Treasurers need to work closely with an adult who can help them understand how to do their job and the importance of it to their club as a whole.

Remember the financial records tell a story about what your club values and supports. Add enough detail to the lines to explain where the money came from and why it was paid out. If money is paid to an individual, tell why (i.e. camp scholarship, reimbursement for supplies, etc.)

We know you care all good stewards of the money in your treasuries and keeping detail records take some work, but in the end, remember it teaches us all about handling money and being accountable, life lessons worth learning.

Welcoming New Members and Families

Fall is a time of transitions for many 4-H Clubs. Some members graduate and some families may choose to try a new club or new experience. Other families have just learned about 4-H and have chosen your club for their 4-H involvement. Ensuring that these new families and members are welcomed into our clubs is everyone's responsibility.

Most of us probably remember being new to a group. We probably felt excited to experience new things and meet new people. Often, we felt nervous and worried because we didn't completely understand what was going on. Sometimes, we feel this way for quite a while. We're going to focus on how we can welcome new members and their families by getting better acquainted and sharing information on how 4-H works. Here is an activity to try to welcome new members:

Activity: Across the line

(Direct club members to stand on one side of the line. If there is enough space, include parents and volunteers. As an option you could have participants stand up and sit down instead of crossing a line.) This is a get-to-know-you-better-game. (Add or change questions to better fit your club). When I make a statement that applies to you, step over the line. Look around and see who has stepped across the line and who hasn't. After we're done with the statement, you will step back across the line before the next one. Step across the line...

- 1. If you like summer
- 2. If you're wearing red
- 3. If you ate breakfast this morning
- 4. If you've been in the 4-H club for three or more years
- If you like winter
- 6. If you have blue eyes
- 7. If you've been to 4-H camp
- 8. If you like mushrooms on your pizza
- 9. If you're in the 4-H Foods Project (or substitute a popular club project)
- 10. If you have a brother
- 11. If you play a sport
- 12. If you've given a talk/speech/demo in 4-H
- 13. If you've ever been to Washington, D.C.
- 14. If you've taken a project to the Northern Wisconsin State Fair
- 15. If you are a dog person

Did anyone learn something new about someone? How about something new about someone that you've know for a while?

All of us were new to 4-H at one time. We know that it seems like a lot to learn and it can be a bit overwhelming. Our goal is to have fun while learning new skills. It is not our goal to frustrate new people. So, experience 4-H one season at a time. Ask questions. We're glad to have new members and families in our group! You make our club fun and interesting!

To be eligible, candidates must be in 9th grade or above and must have completed at least three years of 4-H and one year of youth leadership.

Each Key Award recipient receives a framed certificate and Key Award pin.



RULES FOR 4-H MUSIC FESTIVAL and INFORMATION ON HELPER ROLES AT THE FESTIVAL

Each 4-H music group must contain at least five 4-H members. Clubs may have more than one entry. Members may participate as a performer in only one group. Clubs may combine to form a group.

TYPES OF ENTRIES:

Vocal Five or more vocalists with or without accompaniment. Emphasis is

on the vocal quality of the music. Minimal costuming (if any) and no props or choreography. Accompaniment can be taped, BUT IT MUST

BE INSTRUMENTAL ONLY, NO VOCAL.

Instrumental Five or more instrumentalists with standard musical instruments.

Emphasis is on the instrumental quality of the music. Minimal

costuming and no props or choreography.

Dance Five or more dancers. Accompaniment may be recorded and can

have vocal on tape. Emphasis is on the quality of dance.

Performance may be with or without costumes or props.

Novelty Five or more performers. Emphasis is on total production. Should

include choreography*, costumes and props. Generally has a topical theme or focus. Pantomiming to records is not permitted. Accompaniment can be taped, BUT IT MUST BE INSTRUMENTAL ONLY, NO VOCAL. *Choreography is the composition and

arrangement of vocalists/dancers.

MUSIC FESTIVAL RULES:

(1) Accompaniments and direction can be by 4-H members or adults. Adult accompanists or directors will not be allowed to sing with their group's presentation. Taped INSTRUMENTAL accompaniment is acceptable. <u>Each category will be judged independently</u>; that is, dance against dance, vocal against vocal, etc., and rated as follows:

All groups: Gold Silver

Special certificates will be given according to the discretion of the judge(s) (as in costuming, use of young members, audience appeal, etc.).

- (2) All performances must be no longer than **15 minutes** in length, *including set up and take down*. Make sure that your performance, not only the music, singing, etc., but EVERYTHING you do on stage fits within the 15 minute time limit! If you go over the 15-minute limit, you may be dropped a placing, at the discretion of the judge(s).
- (3) Groups must supply any props, except piano and folding chairs.

- (4) Two judges will share the responsibility of evaluating the music presentations, and will talk to the performers on stage *after the group completes its take-down*. Written critiques will be given at the end of the evening to each group.
- (5) No hay bales, straw bales, candles or real fire on stage.
- (6) There will be no practices allowed on the stage the day of the festival.
- (7) Each county can select one music group to perform at State Fair.

A schedule for workers will be set up at the final music committee meeting and will be sent out with the final performance schedule.

Consider It

The Tri-County Music Festival will be coming up before you know it. We are hoping your club will consider preparing an entry for this event. Your participation will make the afternoon a great one for members, families and friends!

Points to Ponder

A music entry consists of 5 or more 4-H club members. Clubs may combine members to present a musical performance. Clubs may also have more than one entry in the Music Festival. Entries may be vocal, instrumental, dance, novelty, or any combination of these. Groups may use pianists, instrumentalists, or recorded music for accompaniment. Groups may choose to perform without any accompaniment (a capella). Performance time is 10 minutes with an additional 5 minutes allowed for set-up and removal of props.

Helpful Hints

If you don't have someone who works with music in your club, find a musical helper within your community. Have one adult leader supervise the music preparations and another adult leader organize props and costumes, etc. Plan ahead. Plan to get started in right away as enrollment begins now. Begin practice about a month before the festival. It helps to prepare audio tapes and give them to group members to listen to and sing to - this reduces practice time considerably. Remember to turn in your music festival registration form on time. Use a theme. Use narration or speaking parts/dialog to

transition between musical selections. Several shorter songs are better than one longer one.

Music from tv or motion pictures --patriotic music saluting America --ethnic music --- a salute to a famous person or character --- music around the world --- a salute to 4-H --- school days --- animals --- the zoo --- Disney music --- rock 'n' roll --- square dancing --traveling --- clowns --- the circus --- the railroad --- dancing from the 50s, 60s, 70s, 80s and 90s --- music from long ago --- cowboys --- country western music --- families --- children's songs --nursery rhymes --- a salute to the armed forces --- a salute to a special day/event in history --- magical things --- sweet things --- sacred music --- etc. etc. etc. Be creative, involve the members Have fun!

Demonstration & Speaking Contest

Helping people speak in front of groups is one of the most important life skills 4-H offers. One of the best ways to help 4-H members prepare for the future is by helping them to become better public speakers & demonstrators. With this in mind, we would like all clubs to work together to stress the importance of speaking & demonstrations.

4-H Demonstration

The ability to demonstrate is an important speaking skill. Demonstrating means that you show how to do or make something while you talk. Here are some tips:

- · Select something that you do well
- Make attractive posters. Use large letters and space them so that they are easy to read.
- · Assemble all materials necessary to complete your demonstration.
- · Demonstrate as you talk.
- Show the finished product.
- · Summarize the steps of the demonstration.

An educational brochure is available from the Extension Office on how to do a demonstration.

DEMONSTRATION DIVISION

Age categories and time limits:

"Cloverbuds (K-2) - maximum time: 3 minutes

" 3rd & 4th Grade: 4-5 minutes " 5th & 6th Grade: 5-8 minutes " 7th & 8th Grade: 6-10 minutes " 9th Grade & Up: 8-15 minutes

The categories listed below are types of demonstrations that can be done in the contest. You may enter more than one category. You may also enter as an individual and/or as a team in each category.

<u>Formal Demonstrations</u> - Showing and telling the audience how to make or do something. Presents information through <u>actions</u> with an explanation. Has an introduction, body, conclusion, and a time to answer questions. Length is determined by your age group (see above).

<u>Illustrated Talk</u> - Presents information with the use of visual aids such as maps, charts, posters, graphs, pictures, slides, or models. Has an introduction, body, conclusion, and time to answer questions. Length is determined by age group (see above).

<u>Action Center</u> - Sharing ideas and showing how to do a skill in an informal way. The audience should participate and ask questions throughout the entire demonstration. The demonstrator converses with the audience members who are standing around the demonstration area. Audience participates by talking with the demonstrator, trying

things, doing, tasting, judging and asking questions. Handouts may be used (instructions, recipes, etc.). Posters or pictures can be used. The demonstration should be 15-30 minutes long. A brochure is available at the Extension Office which gives tips for planning and presenting your action center.

Recognition:

- All Demonstration Contest participants will receive a fair ribbon.
- · Certificates will be awarded for each participant.
- The top two demonstrations in the middle or high school categories from each county will also have the opportunity to represent their county at the 2018 State Fair (demonstrator must be at least 12 years of age).
- Fair premiums will be offered to all participants, per individual county rules. You
 MUST enter your demonstration on your fair form to receive premium.

The amounts listed above are for individual demonstrations. Team demonstrations will be awarded a premium double the amount of the individual premium. These premiums will be paid along with your regular fair check. The <u>deadline to register</u> (late entries will NOT receive fair premiums) is December 29, 2017.

SPEAKING DIVISION

The following are four categories and rules (enter any or all):

Original Speech

Cloverbuds: up to 1 minute (Grades K-2) Novice: 1-2 minutes (Grades 3 & 4) Junior: 2-3 minutes (Grades 5 & 6)

Intermediate: 3-4 minutes (Grades 7 & 8)

Senior: 4-6 minutes (Grades 9-13)

Rules:

- 1. Talk must be developed by the member who is presenting it. It cannot have been given previously in another contest or previously critiqued.
- 2. Only Cloverbud & Novice division speakers may have their speeches written out and read them. Junior through Senior division speakers should use note cards.

Interpretive Reading

Cloverbuds: Up to 1 minute (Grades K-2) Novice: 1-2 minutes (Grades 3 & 4) Junior: 2-3 minutes (Grades 5 & 6)

Intermediate: 3-4 minutes (Grades 7 & 8)

Senior: 4-6 minutes (Grades 9-13)

Rules:

- 1. Readings may be either prose, poetry, original, or a selected reading. If not original, the author should be credited.
- 2. All readers should use full-size copies of their selections (**NO** notecards). Please mount your copy on construction paper or other heavy paper (8 ½ x 11" or 9 x 12"). Do NOT read your selection from the book.
- 3. Create an introduction to introduce your reading.

Contact the Extension Office for an information sheet that provides more information and tips for doing Interpretive Readings.

<u>4-H Promotion</u> - Your chance to promote 4-H. Tell why you are involved and why others should join. Props or visual aids are optional.

- Novice: 1-2 minutes (Grades 3 & 4)
- Junior: 2-3 minutes (Grades 5 & 6)
- Intermediate & Senior: 3-4 minutes (Grades 7-13)

<u>Dynamic Duo</u> - For a team of two - may be two 4-H members of any age or combination of ages or a 4-H member and an adult. This is an interpretive reading consisting of a dialogue for two. Up to 6 minutes in length.

Each participant will receive a participation ribbon and a certificate. A top overall speaker in each age division will be selected and receive a trophy (across all entry divisions).

- 3) Tell your story completely.

- NO HEALTH ISSUES smoking, alcohol, drugs, etc. are generally Health Issues!
- Is the title in larger letters than the content?
- Is there enough margin and space around the edges and between line of letters?

VIDEO/POWER POINT RULES

- Individual or group power point or video addressing a safety issue or concern.
- Maximum time is 2 minutes for individual or a group.
- Maximum time is 5 minutes.
- No trademarks or copyrighted materials.

CHIPPEWA COUNTY 4-H SHOOTING SPORTS 2018 ARCHERY PROGRAM

The Chippewa County 4-H Archery program is offered to give members basic information about their bow, different types of arrows & releases, safety in handling their equipment and help in improving their marksmanship. Participants must be in third grade AND eight years old, or older.

Chippewa County 4-H youth in the 2018 Archery program have a choice to participate at the Bloomer Rod and Gun Club, Bloomer or Stanley Rod & Gun at Chapman Park. We will be doing the annual Bow Safety check 1 hour prior to the first scheduled shoot at the Bloomer Rod & Gun location. The Equipment Check is REQUIRED* for all youth in the archery program. If you own your equipment, it will be checked for safety and proper fit for the individual. The Shooting Sports Committee has left and right hand bows for those who do not own equipment. All archery youth, who own their own bow, are responsible for providing their own arrows. All arrows must have field tips. No over-sized tips will be allowed in our program.

*Members who own equipment and wish to have an authorized non-4-H individual check it for safety and proper fit will need to have their Equipment Check form signed by that individual and turned in before the first shoot. These forms are available upon request.

Approximately 600 youth attend this pre-college program in Madison each summer. Participants take part in educational seminars and assemblies and meet people from across Wisconsin. They are encouraged to take what they learn and share it with others in their home community.

Qualifications:

- Be in 7th-10th grade at the time of selection.
- Members of Wisconsin Leadership Council, State Art Team, State Communications Team and Drama Company may be in 9th-13th grade.

American Spirit West When: TBD

The American Spirit West Leadership Program is an experience that will begin with transportation to St. Croix Falls and head west from there. Partnering with the National Park Service, seven national parks will be featured: St. Croix Falls National Scenic Riverway, Badlands National Park, Mt. Rushmore National Memorial, Jewel Cave National Monument, Yellowstone National Park, Grant Teton National Park and Devils Tower National Monument. Activities will include ranger-led education programs, service learning projects, hiking, some camping and fun! Youth will learn about the foundation and background of national parks, gain appreciation of natural resources and gain outdoor and leadership skills. Delegates team up for hands-on mock space missions and other STEM activities in this NASA program while exchanging ideas with youth from across Wisconsin.

Qualifications:

OVERVIEW

This document explains the process of a family re-enrolling members and leaders in 4HOnline.

GETTING STARTED

To get started with the re-enrollment process, log into 4HOnline with your family email and password.

On the family home screen, click on the orange button labeled **Continue to Family**.

On your Member/Volunteer list, find the family member you wish to re-enroll and click on **Edit** next to their name.

RE-ENROLL

At the bottom of the next screen, click on the button for Enroll for 2017-2018.

You will now see the Personal Information that you entered when you first enrolled. Look over the information and make any corrections. When you are done, click on **Continue**.

Next is the Additional Information screen where you will need to accept the agreements and answer the Photo Release and Accommodations questions. Click **Continue** when done.

The Health Form for members is optional at enrollment, but you will be asked to complete it in the future if you attend any overnight events. Completing this form at enrollment will help streamline event preparation. Click **Continue** when done.

If you are an adult volunteer and see the Volunteer Screening page, then it has been 4 years since the last time a background check has been completed. You need to check over the answers to the questions and correct as needed. This page will only appear every 4 years. Click **Continue** when done.

On the Participation →Club Screen, confirm the correct club is listed. If you serve in a volunteer role (but not as a project leader) click on **Update** to save the change. Click on **Continue** when done.

On the Participation → Projects Screen, confirm all the projects you are enrolled in are listed. Add any missing projects. If you are dropping a project, click on **Edit** for that project and then click on **Delete**. After making sure all your projects are listed correctly, click on **Submit Enrollment**.
