There are four essential elements to positive youth development that are con-
nected to the 4 H's. The four essential elements: to belong, to master, to be
independent and to be generous, meet the needs of youth and provide the
building blocks for life skill development.

The need to belong goes with **heart:** Youth need to know they are cared about by others and feel a part of a group.

- Help club members feel they are a part of the group by having activities and ice breaker activities
- Create a welcoming environment for families
- Provide opportunities for youth to interact with each other through 4-H projects and activities.

The need to be generous goes with **health:** Youth need to have meaning and purpose in their life. It is important for youth to experience giving back to others through service projects.

- Youth should identify service projects to meet their interests and abilities to give back to the community.
- Mentor others.
- Arrange tours of local sites and opportunities.

The need to be independent goes with **head:** Youth need to be given a chance to learn self-discipline and responsibility.

- Give youth simple tasks and when they are ready, help them progress to more difficult tasks.
- Encourage, motivate and praise youth who take leadership roles.
- Train and support youth taking leadership roles.

The need to master goes with **hands**: Youth need to feel and experience success and meet challenges to help develop their self-confidence.

- Be fair and consistent in giving feedback.
- Do not be afraid to show frustration in front of youth-it's part of the learning process.
- Provide project learning experiences.

"Achievement and Member in Good Standing"

The Chippewa County 4-H Leaders Council requires 4-H members who participate in county-wide educational programs to meet Achievement and Member in Good Standing criteria. These educational programs include, but are not limited to, the 4-H/FFA Quality Meat Animal Program, Chippewa County 4-H Horse Program, 4-H Shooting Sports

Program, 4-H Dog Program, etc. To Achieve and be a Member in Good Standing, a member must:

- Give a demonstration or talk
- Exhibit a project at club meeting, club tour, public exhibit, community or county fair
- Complete your record book by August 31 or date set by club leadership
- Attend monthly club meetings regularly and participate in club activities (4-H Club may designate a percentage rule
- Re-enroll through 4-H Online by November 1

If planning to participate in county-wide educational programs during the 2018-2019 4-H year, 4-H members should plan to meet Achievement and Member in Good Standing criteria for the 2017-2018 4-H Year. Members not meeting Achievement and Member in Good Standing criteria will be ineligible to enroll in county-wide educational programs, apply for trips, scholarships, etc.

If you have questions about meeting these requirements, contact your local 4-H Club Leader and/or Program Chair.

- The busiest day for enrollments was October 31st with 308 adults and 1,026 youth enrolling on that day alone!
- We have had 8,872 adults and 23,277 youth enroll in 4-H!

4-H Winter Activities and Club Insurance

A friendly reminder that downhill skiing, snowboarding, sledding and other downhill winter sports are excluded (not covered) by the AIL year round accident policy used by 4-H clubs on a statewide, county wide, and individual club basis. The good news is coverage is available online at www.americanincomelife.com by choosing the "Submit 4-H Activity Report" button and requesting special activity insurance used for individual group events like ski trips. All three plan options provide full accident coverage for downhill skiing. snowboarding, sledding and other downhill winter sports. As with all your activities be sure to follow all safety measures communicated by your state as well as rules and regulations posted at the facility being used.

Member Enrollment

As a reminder all 4-H members wishing to show at the junior fair MUST be enrolled by February 1 of each calendar year to be eligible to show their projects at the NWSF Junior Fair.

Another reminder to share with families is that all projects must be finalized in 4-H Online by March 1. 2018. Projects may be added or dropped before the deadline.

Wisconsin State Fair Dairy Promotion Board Scholarship Program

The Wisconsin State Fair Dairy Promotion Board is offering \$1,000 scholarships to students that will be third or fourth-year college students during the 2018-19 academic year. Additional \$1,000 scholarships will be awarded to high school seniors that will be first-year college students during the 2018-19 academic year. Students studying in a two-year program are also encouraged to apply.

Any Wisconsin resident who will enroll or is currently enrolled as a full-time student in a two or four-year Wisconsin school or short course program and is pursuing a dairy-related or food science degree is eligible for scholarship consideration.

All applicants are required to submit an application electronically no later than **March 23, 2018.**

Applicants will be evaluated on involvement and leadership in dairy-related activities, scholastic achievement, and career objectives. The scholarship committee will select finalists from the eligible applications received. Finalists will be interviewed, with the recipients to be recognized at both the Dairyland Youth Celebration and Blue Ribbon Cheese & Butter Auction during the 2018 Wisconsin State Fair. Youth Agriculture Loans

The Farm Service Agency (FSA) makes loans to individual young persons to start and operate income-producing projects of modest size in connection with their participation in 4-H clubs, FFA, a Tribal youth group, or similar agricultural youth organization. The project being financed with an FSA Youth Loan needs to provide an opportunity for the young person to acquire experience and education in agriculture-related skills.

The Youth Loan application requires a recommendation from a project advisor who verifies that he/she will sponsor the loan applicant, has the correct training and experience to supervise your project, and is available to help whenever needed.

If you are between the ages of 10 and 20 years at the time of loan closing, parent(s) and/or legal guardian (s) must consent to the loan application. Young people applying for a Youth Loan are personally responsible for repaying the loan. A co-signer is required only if the project shows possible difficulty in repaying the loan or does not meet security requirements. Animal Science (cont'd)

Starting fall of 2017, Wisconsin replaced the MAQA (Meat Animal Quality Assurance) program with the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) national program. This new and interactive program provides youth a number of options for an annual quality assurance certification. YQCA was created for youth in the Beef, Dairy Goat, Poultry, Rabbit, Sheep, and Swine projects.

YQCA will provide a common framework for food animal quality assurance programs which will:

- Strengthen the youth educational experience
- Improve the care of food animals
- Promote a higher level of consumer food safety

This program will allow youth to learn about other species of animals, not just the species they show. This program allows for the consistency of information being taught to youth in all states and in all species of animals.

YQCA content and modules will demonstrate a progression of topic knowledge in designated age categories (Age as of January 1):

Junior (8-11 years old)
Intermediate (12-14 years old)
Senior (15-18 years old)
Young Adult (19-21 years old)



Each year, youth complete one new module in each of the following categories:

Animal Welfare - basic needs, proper animal handling, biosecurity, etc. **Food Safety** - medications, medicated feeds, withdrawal times, avoiding residue, etc. **Character Education** - Ethics, goal setting, career exploration

YQCA gives families more flexibility in gaining this required certification, which is more convenient to accommodate busy seasonal schedules. It's estimated that youth will spend roughly 60 minutes completing modules each year. Participating in the online program also saves money on fuel and food costs that can come with attending trainings.

YQCA illustrates the next generation of learning and can be offered to youth in a couple of ways:

- Online curriculum a youth exhibitor annually will complete three interactive online modules and corresponding guizzes.
- Available 24/7, which allows exhibitors flexibility to take course at their convenience.
- Face to face Trainer leg program

YQCA will replace Wisconsin's MAQA program and the National Pork Board Youth PQA program, both of which will no longer be in existence. Wisconsin 4-H and FFA leaders are pleased to share their joint support of this program which was implemented in Wisconsin starting in fall of 2017. In addition, Wisconsin State Fair and other national exhibitions will require certification in YQCA for participation in 2018 events.

Why quality assurance education?

- The livestock industry and business are constantly striving for high quality, wholesome products.
- All species organizations have quality assurance programs. (BQA, FARM (Dairy), PQA, etc.)
- Consumers are more interested in how and where their food is produced.
- United States exports a lot of pork and beef. If there is a poor experience, that market is lost and it affects the whole industry.


Youth Leadership Derby

Bubbling Blob Lava Lamp

Items you will need:

20 oz. Bottle or jar with lid
6 oz. water
10 drops food coloring (color of choice)
10 oz. inexpensive vegetable oil
1 Alka-Seltzer tablet (divided into 4 pieces)
Hot glue gun



This experiment will teach youth that oil and water do not mix without chemical help.

In your 20 oz. bottle or jar, add oil, water and then the food coloring. You can see the food coloring drops form into balls and sink to the bottom of the oil without mixing. See how the food coloring mixes with the water, but not the oil? Put on the lid tightly and gently tip the bottle/jar back and forth. You will see how the oil will break up into little blobs. See how you cannot get the oil and water to mix?

Next, you can drop 1 piece of the Alka-Seltzer tablet into the bottle to see the reaction of the water making tiny bubbles of carbon dioxide. You will see the tiny bubbles attach themselves to the blobs of colored water and cause them to float to the surface. When the bubbles reach the surface and pop, the colored blobs will sink back to the bottom of the bottle/jar. Each time the bubbling stops, you can repeat this step with another piece of the Alka-Seltzer tablet.

When all of the bubbling has stopped from the Alka-Seltzer, hot glue the lid on the bottle/jar and tip the bottle back and forth to see the droplets join together to make a wave blob.

If you would like to dispose of the liquid, we recommend adding 1 tsp of Dawn dish soap to break down the molecules.

Adult supervision of this experiment is recommended.

Engineering Challenge

The Chippewa County 4-H Engineering Challenge Official Rules 2018

Bridge Building:

Competitors will be given 12 sticks of $1/8" \times 1/8"$ balsa wood strips to build a bridge. The only building material to be used will be the supplied wood strips. The only fastening of strips will be glue of their own choosing. With your materials you need to build a bridge that will sit on the existing foundations, spanning a minimum of 15.5" and be no more than 16" with a width of no more than 4" and the height will be limited to 6". No part of the bridge can hang below the foundations. Your bridge will need to have a place to support a 3"x 3" plate the weight bucket will be hung from.

The test: Your bridge will be placed on the fountains, a plate with the hook hanging from the bottom of it will be set in the middle of the bridge. The weight bucket and plate weigh 10 lbs, and the weights weight 1 pound each. Weight will be added until the bridge collapses, the individual whose bridge holds the most weight before failure wins! For ideas check out balsam wood bridges on the internet.

Sail Car:

Competitors will need to build a car that will be powered by paper sail. The car can be built of material of your own choosing and design, but must not exceed 12" long, 10" wide, and 10" tall including the mast and/or sail. The sail must be it's only source of power, no other forms of stored energy can be used. While you are free to do experiments in your sail design prior to the event, you must bring your car 'sail free' to the event. You will then be given one sheet of paper (*Georgia-Pacific Basic Copy Paper, 8.5" x* 11", 20 lb, 88 Brightness—available at Wal-Mart) to make your sail the day of, so bring any other supplies needed. The car will be placed in front of a 20" box fan, once the fan is turned on, the fan will stay on until the car quits moving. The one who's car makes it the furthest is the winner.

Paper Airplane:

Competitors will be given one sheet of paper (*Georgia-Pacific Basic Copy Paper*, 8.5" x 11", 20 lb, 88 Brightness —available at Wal-Mart) the day of the event. You can practice at home, but going off Paper Aircraft Association Rules, you will be given one sheet the day of the event, and allowed 10 minutes to fold your plane. While you can fold as many times as you need, there is no cutting, ripping, gluing, tape, staples, or paperclips allowed. You will be given two throws, the throw going longest distance of the two will be your official measurement.

In the event of a tie, there will be some 4-H trivia questions to determine the winner!

This years competition will once again be held at the Teen's Volleyball Tournament in Cadott on March 18th

Cost is \$10.00 including the bridge building supplies. Supplies can be purchased direct from Scott Hansen or they are also be available at the Extension Office.

TITLE IX INFORMATION

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972

The specific purposes of Title IX are to prohibit discrimination against individuals in federally-funded programs or activities, and in every aspect of employment because of their gender. Title IX provisions include prohibitions against male/female job-related stereotyping, sexual harassment, unequal opportunities for training, advancement and other benefits of employment.

TITLE IX AND 4-H QUOTAS

Given that the use of quotas to assure representation of boys and girls on a team are NOT in compliance with Title IX, what are some strategies for assuring that boys and girls have equal opportunity to play in sports?

For contact sports, separate teams of boys and girls are allowed. For non-contact sports, adult managers/coaches should *emphasize the educational value of the 4-H program (versus solely focusing upon the win/loss record)*. They must examine every step in the process to remove barriers facing girls that the boys would not have to overcome. For example, when boys and girls are playing on the same team, rules or policies requiring equal playing time may be a strategy. Different standards, criteria, or rules for boys and girls are NOT the answer.

BE SURE YOUR TEAM HAS ALLOWED ALL GIRLS AND BOYS, WHO WANTED TO PLAY KICKBALL, TO DO SO.

ALL plays must be registered at the Eau Claire County Extension Office by Friday, February 23. Telephone registrations will NOT be accepted.

A set of rules for our festival follow.

- Entry Division and Length of Performances: The difference between the two drama categories is as follows:
 - a. *On-Stage Drama* is a traditional one-act play using full costumes, props and sets. This may be performed on a stage with or without curtains.
 - 1. One play, any length up to 30 minutes, including set-up and take-down time. It is suggested that performances be about 20 minutes in length.
 - Performances must include two or more actors.
 - 3. Any props that touch the floor must have felt on them to protect the floor.
 - b. Mini-Dramas and Skits can be performed at or in any place (setting) and might include puppetry, creative dramatics, etc. No stage or lighting will be provided. Performances must include two or more actors.
 - 1. *Mini-dramas* may use costumes and props similar to on-stage drama performances
 - 2. **Skits** use **minimal** props and costumes (less is better)
 - 3. Mini drama and skit performances can be any length up to 15 minutes, including set-up and takedown time. Plays need to be within guideline.
 - c. *Puppetry* can be up to 15 minutes and provide own puppet stage.
- 2. All actors must be 4-H members. The director(s) may be any 4-H member(s) and/or adult(s).
- 3. Stage lighting may be available, depending on facilities (mini-drama and skits no stage or lighting provided).

- 4. On-Stage Drama Props: Drama groups should plan for special props and sound effects equipment as needed. Any props need to have felt on the bottom to avoid scratching the stage.
- 5. No hay or straw bales, animals, candles, real fire or real weapons are allowed.
- 6. If a club uses fake weaponry or strobe lights, it must be noted on the registration form.
- Clubs may have more than one entry, but a 4-H member can be involved in only one play.
- 8. The Drama Festival staff will have a Stage Manager/Emcee who will introduce the Club and the Club's Emcee. The Club's Emcee will be expected to introduce the play and set the scene for their play. Introduction of cast used at club's discretion. This will not be timed.
- 9. Your presentation must not be the same one your club presented last year.
- 10. Music plays (NOT reviews), where music is used as part of the play, are acceptable.
- 11. Each group will receive a critique from the evaluators. Each drama participant will receive a participation ribbon and certificate. Clubs will be rated gold or silver.
- 12. Each entry will be given an "Award of Merit" for their area of outstanding achievement. The awards will be given from the following categories:
 - Total Voice Projection
 - Cooperation, Enthusiasm and Spirit
 - Characterization
 - Creative Costuming
 - Audience Appeal
 - Creative Theme Development
 - Set
 - Humor
- 13. Individual awards for outstanding youth performers will be presented, not to exceed two youth per play.
- 14. Best Actor and Best Actress will be selected from each county.

Other helpful information

Evaluation Form: Upon your request, the committee will send an evaluation form that will be used at the festival. It notes the essential parts for viewing and critiquing a dramatic performance, and will be your copy for study prior to the play.
