Hello Chippewa County 4-Hers! I would like to take this time to introduce myself as the new 4-H Program Coordinator.

For some of you that know me already, you might know me as the lifeguard for Chippewa County's 4-H Camp at Kamp Kenwood. The long-standing joke among the Camp Committee was that I was a "transplant" from Dunn County, which is now entirely true. I spent thirteen years as a 4-Her in Dunn County and grew up in Menomonie. I kept busy through showing rabbits, creating many exhibits for the exhibit hall, being an Ambassador, and engaging in 4-H experiences at the county, district, state and national levels. Without these experiences through camp, leadership, and project based learning, I would not be who I am today!

Before working for UW-Extension, I was a social studies teacher for three years and then worked for Minnesota 4-H. I loved my time in Minnesota 4-H, but being a true Wisconsinite at heart along with being from the Chippewa Valley led me to wanting to work/working in Chippewa County.

Outside of 4-H, I love to be outside in some of the great places that the Chippewa Valley offers. As the fair is coming up, I wanted to share one of my favorite fair lessons with you. Like I said earlier, rabbits were my main animal project in the Dunn County Fair. Like every department, there is always someone you want to beat. In rabbit showmanship, it just happened to be my twin sister Hanna. Each year, it seemed like I always placed second to her. In 2003, my goal for that year's fair was to win senior rabbit showmanship over my twin sister. I worked so hard studying, working with my animals and devoting time each day to my project. After months of dedication, it came to fair time. The rabbit judge wanted us to use someone else's rabbit to provide a different challenge to the youth in the senior division. We had to think quickly on our feet to ask a friend to borrow a rabbit and prepare ourselves to demonstrate our knowledge to the judge. Thankfully, my hard work paid off and ultimately I accomplished my goal. Yes, it was nice to have that shiny trophy on my shelf, but what was more rewarding was creating a goal, implementing a plan, and following that plan to fruition.

As we look towards the Northern Wisconsin State Fair only a month away, I encourage you as a 4-Her (or a parent of a 4-Her) to create a goal for a project area, develop a plan and strategies to help get you to this goal and try to accomplish it! Even if it does not go

the way you want it, you still come out on top because you LEARNED throughout the process.

I am looking forward to seeing and learning about your projects at the Northern Wisconsin State Fair!

"Achievement and Member in Good Standing"

The Chippewa County 4-H Leaders Council requires 4-H members who participate in county-wide educational programs to meet Achievement and Member in Good Standing criteria. These educational programs include, but are not limited to, the 4-H/FFA Quality Meat Animal Program, Chippewa County 4-H Horse Program, 4-H Shooting Sports

Program, 4-H Dog Program, etc. To Achieve and be a Member in Good Standing, a member must:

- Give a demonstration or talk
- Exhibit a project at club meeting, club tour, public exhibit, community or county fair
- Complete your record book by August 31 or date set by club leadership
- Attend monthly club meetings regularly and participate in club activities (4-H Club may designate a percentage rule
- Re-enroll through 4-H Online by November 1

If planning to participate in county-wide educational programs during the 2018-2019 4-H year, 4-H members should plan to meet Achievement and Member in Good Standing criteria for the 2017-2018 4-H Year. Members not meeting Achievement and Member in Good Standing criteria will be ineligible to enroll in county-wide educational programs, apply for trips, scholarships, etc.

If you have questions about meeting these requirements, contact your local 4-H Club Leader and/or Program Chair.

Celebrate the Arts

The WI 4-H Foundation is excited to announce a brand new event to support and promote 4-H ARTS called "Celebrate The Arts". This event will be held in October 13, 2018 and will include an Arts Auction and Reception to support and promote the 4-H Arts Program.

To make this event successful, Wisconsin 4-H Foundation is sponsoring an Arts Contest with cash prizes totaling \$700. To be eligible for the contest, youth must be a 4-H member in good standing for the 2017-18 program year. Entrants do not need to be enrolled in any specific project to participate. All arts must fit into or use the theme "Head, Heart, Hands, Health". The contest will be divided into four categories: Drawing Using any Medium, Painting (Watercolor, Acrylic or Oil), Paper or Fiber Art, and Photography.

First and second place will be awarded in each category with a Best of Show Award given to one entry chosen by the judging committee. Category winners will receive a \$100 cash award and reserve in each category will receive a \$50 cash award. The Best of Show Entry will receive an additional \$100 cash award. Entries will be accepted on Monday, June 25, 2018 from 11:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m., at Sellery Hall on the UW-Madison Campus. Entries can be delivered by the artist, representative of the artist, a County Youth Educator or a member of a county delegation to WI 4-H & Youth Conference. Items can also be mailed prior to June 25th to: Celebrate The Arts, 610 Langdon Street, 436 Lowell Hall, Madison, WI 53703.

Items not placing first or second in their division will be released at the conclusion of WI 4-H & Youth Conference. Any item not picked up at the conclusion of the conference will NOT be returned to the artist. All items must have the following information printed on or firmly attached to the back of the art:

- 1. Artist Name
- 2. Artist Address
- 3. Artist email (if available)
- 4. Artist Phone Number
- 5. Artist County
- 6. Artist 4-H Club Name and Leaders Name
- 7. Artist Grade
- 8. Brief description (100 words or less) of the inspiration for the piece
- 9. Brief statement (100 words or less) about what 4-H means to the artist

The first and second place items in each category will become the property of the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation and will not be returned. The top two entries in each category will be sold at "Celebrate the Arts". Artists of the winning pieces will be invited to attend the event and present their artwork at the auction.

Cloverbud and Exploring Fair Judging

Items entered in Department B-17 will be conferenced judged on Tuesday, July 10th from 1:00 p.m. - 6:00 p.m. Cloverbuds and Explorer project members will need to contact the Extension Office to schedule their judging time. Judging begins at 1:00 p.m. and will continue every 5 minutes with 6:00 p.m. as the last judging time. Cloverbuds or Explorer project members that do not schedule a judging time before June 22, 2018 will be asked to wait until a judge is available without hindering the schedule on judging day.

Fair Entries

Fair entries are currently open. Premium books were put in each club drawer last month and can be found online at the Northern Wisconsin Fair website. All mailed entries must be postmarked by June 13, 2018. All online entries must be submitted by June 18, 2018.

A late fee of \$15.00 will be assessed to all entries received by mail or walk in after June 14. Absolutely no entries or changes will be accepted after June 22.

Please remember if you are bringing more than one market animal to the fair, to enter all animals on your fair entry. This ensures pen availability for all animals that youth wish to bring.

Wristbands

Each entry person will receive one (1) weekly armband included in their entry fee. Additional armbands will be available for purchase on your entry form only, for an additional \$15.00 each. You must make this purchase at the time of your entry and cannot add at a later time.

Shavings

The NWSF will offer bales of shavings, for pre-order only, for \$5.00 per bale. You must pre-order these on your entry form.

Project Demonstrations

A project demonstration time will be available for youth to complete during the fair in the 4-H Youth Building. Youth will have the opportunity to provide a demonstration related to their fair projects on the stage in the Youth Building. This will allow them to complete this step in their achievement process and also provide awareness to visitors about 4-H. It's not just about the animals! Youth will need to preregister their project demonstration with the Extension Office by June 22, 2018.

Youth Food Preservation Awards

Exhibits canned in Ball jars and sealed with Ball lids or Kerr jars and Kerr lids will be considered for awards in fruits, vegetables, pickled foods and soft spreads. Please see rules printed in the fair premium book under Department B-25 Foods/Food Preservation.

Club Booths - Department B-32

Booth space is limited. Register your clubs booth under the club advisor's name by June 18th online. Also, notify the Extension Office by June 22nd that your club will be decorating a booth at the fair. Your club booth must include representative work of more than 2 club members. Adults are allowed to act in an advisory capacity only and are not to the fair booth set up. See additional rules in the premium book.

Do you Know Danish?



This is not a question about speaking a foreign language, but rather concerns your understanding of the system of judging used at our county fair. Danish judging means that there can only be a certain number of blue, red or white ribbons depending on the number of exhibits in a specific lot number. If there are more than two articles, then all of them cannot receive blues. In general there can only be about 25% of blues, 50% blues and reds and 75% blues, red and whites. Danish judging is followed for nearly every class of the county fair. Exceptions include Explorers, Cloverbuds, Self-Determined, Cultural Arts, Foods & Nutrition, Flowers & Houseplants and the Clothing and Food Revues. If you have questions on the Danish system of judging, please ask the Extension Staff or Department Superintendent.



Tips for First Time Exhibitors

(and a good reminder for ALL fair exhibitors)

- 1. Entry day, Tuesday, July 10th, bring your non-animal exhibits to the fairgrounds between 1:00 p.m. 6:00 p.m. (with exceptions of some food, plant and animal exhibits). All exhibits, unless specified, must be in place by 6:00 p.m. Entry tags that were not mailed directly to you may be picked up at the Fair Office during office hours.
- 2. Attach entry tags to your exhibits and take them to the proper place.
- All entries are exhibited at the exhibitor's own risk The Northern Wisconsin State Fair and UW-Extension Office will take every reasonable precaution, but will not be responsible for damages, loss or theft.
- 4. Check the Fair Premium Book for time of judging for each department. In some areas such as Clo verbuds, Explorers, Live Animal Projects, a other certain departments, you are required to be present for judging. In all other areas you are welcome and encouraged to be present for judging, in order to learn from the judges' comments.
- 5. Unloading and loading of livestock must be done in designed areas only.
- 6. No exhibits are to be removed before 5:00 p.m. on Sunday, July 15th; however, all exhibits must be removed by 7:00 p.m. Exceptions are animal exhibits as noted in the Fair Premium Book.

THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT FOR FAIR JUDGING

You've entered the County Fair and perhaps you're wondering what to do next. Hopefully, the following information will help you prepare for this year's fair.

4-H'ers "Learn by Showing" Learning through the Exhibit Experience

It is important to consider three major criteria used by judges:

- The learning involved
- Workmanship and techniques
- General appearance and design

The judge should use the appropriate standards in each category that relates to the 4-H'ers goals and exhibit.

To help prepare for face-to-face judging, the 4-H'er should be able to answer questions like:

- What did you want to accomplish by creating this exhibit?
- What was the most important thing you learned as you worked toward your goal?
- How did you go about working towards your goal?
- What ideas or plan do you have for the future based on what you have learned or discovered?
- What did you consider as you evaluated your work?

As you work, prepare for Fair Judging. You might want to role-play the judging experience.

What the Color of the Ribbon Means

While at the Fair, exhibits are awarded a ribbon placing. Think of the placement this way:

Blue - Very Good Work Red - Above Average Work White - Average Work Pink - Needs Improvement

*Work for a Blue Ribbon child; not the blue ribbon exhibit.

Merit Awards represent either a standard of perfection or unique quality or special technique.

The color of the ribbon should not be considered more important than the experiences and skills the member gains from being in 4-H. Making the entries and sharing them one-to-one with a judge are valuable experiences for youth development.

Definitions

Animal judging - Animals (dairy, poultry, rabbits, beef, sheep, swine and goats) are checked into and housed at the Fair. Judging is done at a later time.

Exhibitor - you, the member, showing entries at the fair

Face-to-Face Judging - a question and answer style used by the judge to discuss an exhibitor's entry.

Judge - person with whom you will talk about the exhibit. This person will determine the ribbon placing on your exhibit.

Judging Day - the day when exhibitor and judge talk about the entry. Entries are left on display until the specified release date and time noted in the premium book.

Judging Stations - various places in the 4-H Youth Building or other buildings, where face-to-face judging will be held.

Release Time - all entries must remain on display until the specified release time as noted in the premium book. No early releases. All items still on display after exhibit removal time may be discarded. Please make arrangements to pick up all of your exhibits.

Premium Book - the listing of all rules, regulations and department lists for the fair.

SOME MORE THINGS TO KEEP IN MIND ABOUT JUDGES AND THE JUDGING PROCESS...

If you've done your best work on your project, it's disappointing not to get the rating you were expecting. Just remember - the judges opinion is simply one person's opinion. A different judge might have given you a different placing.

Even if you don't agree with the judge, it is worth paying attention to what he or she has to say about your project. You could get some great ideas for how to do even better next time. Here are some tips about feedback:

- Pay attention to what the judge *liked* instead of getting upset about what he or she didn't like. Even if there were some negative comments, there were probably just as many positive ones!
- Don't be nervous about face-to-face judging. The judge is truly interested in youth; otherwise he or she wouldn't be there. Relax so you can be your friendly, natural self when the judge meets with you. And if you don't understand something he or she says, be sure to say so.
- Think about how you can use the judge's feedback. What can you do differently if you intend to keep working on this kind of project? What will you want to do the same way?

What if you were the judge? What kind of rating would you give your project if you were judging it? Be honest!

Your opinion matters. Being able to have fun and learn how to do something worthwhile is just as important as whatever the judge thought was your work.

Junior Class vs. Open Class at the County Fair

The Northern Wisconsin State Fair has two divisions; junior class and open class. What is the difference? Why do 4-H members enter under junior class?

Junior class is an opportunity for youth enrolled in an educational program (I.e., 4-H, Boy/Girl Scouts, FFA, etc.) to exhibit items they have learned about and made throughout the year. Youth sign up for projects in 4-H and exhibit entries under their project areas to meet their educational goals and requirements. Throughout the year, 4-H offers educational workshops and programs to teach youth more information about their project interests. In the fair premium book, you will see junior class is limited to youth enrolled in a Chippewa County youth organization with an approved educational plan. The 4-H program makes a promise we are providing youth enrolled in the program education through the different project areas.

Youth and adults who want to enter items in the fair that are not part of an educational youth organization will enter into the open class portion of the fair. This area does not have educational requirements in order for youth or adults to enter.



Cloverbud Corner

See the Wind

A windsock is a type of kite used to detect wind direction and speed. Wind direction helps Meteorologists (scientists who study air temperature, wind direction and speed, and clouds) predict the weather.

Supplies needed:

8 1/2 x 11 inch sturdy paper or cardstock Different colors of crepe paper streamers Kite strings Paper clips (1 per windsock) Tape, tacky glue or hot glue Single hole punch Fan or access to outdoors



<u>Instructions</u>

Have your child decorate their cardstock. Staple or tape the cardstock to make a ring. Tape or glue streamers along the bottom edge of the ring. Punch three holes equal distance around the paper ring at the top edge of the ring. Cut 3 pieces of string about 12 inches along. Tie one end of each string to the windsock at each of the 3 holes. Tie the 3 loose ends of the strong to a single paperclip. Tie an additional 12 inch string to the paperclip.

Questions you can ask youth:

- 1. How does weather affect your life?
- 2. What do you need to think about before going outside?
- 3. What does the windsock do in the wind?
- 4. How can you tell which direction the wind is coming from?
- 5. What else can a windsock tell you besides the direction of the wind is coming from?

Share/Reflect:

Have your child show off their finished windsock. Ask them, where can we hang your windsock? What are some things you might consider before we hang your windsock outside?

More to Explore:

Use plastic bags or ribbon/fabric to make a windsock that is more weather resistant.



Parents and family are invited to attend the camp program at 4:00 p.m. on Wednesday, July 25. Campers will depart


